

QUESTIONS TO ASK YOUR DOCTOR

When Breast Cancer is Diagnosed

If you've been <u>diagnosed</u> with breast cancer, there's a lot to learn. Get all the information you can so you can make important decisions about your care. Be sure to get a copy of your pathology report and other test results.

You may feel overwhelmed or unsure of what to ask your doctor. Here are some questions to help start the conversation.

	What did the results of my breast biopsy show? What kind of breast cancer do I have?
	What tests were done on my tumor? What are my hormone receptor status and HER2 status?
	What is the tumor grade? Is the breast cancer fast or slow growing?
	During my surgery, was the entire tumor removed? What did the margins show?
	During my surgery, were any lymph nodes removed? If so, how many had cancer?
Q: A:	What is the stage of my breast cancer? What does that mean?
Q:	Will tumor profiling tests, such as Oncotype DX® or MammaPrint®, be done on the tumor tissue? If so, how will the results impact my treatment plan?

Do you recommend I get genetic testing for inherited gene mutations? If so, how will the results impact my treatment plan?
What are my treatment options?
What is my prognosis (outcome)?
What are the chances my cancer will come back? What are the chances I will develop another type of cancer?
What support is available to me and my loved ones?
