

QUESTIONS TO ASK YOUR DOCTOR

Metastatic Breast Cancer: Bone Protection

Bone complications may occur in people living with metastatic breast cancer who have <u>bone metastases</u>. They can cause pain, lead to fractures (broken bones), loss of mobility or spinal cord compression. With the use of bone-strengthening drugs, bone complications are not common.

You may feel overwhelmed and unsure of what to ask your doctor. Here are some questions to help start the conversation.

Q: A:	What is my risk of having a bone complication? What can I do to prevent this from happening?
Q: A:	Do any of the drugs I currently take make my bones weaker?
Q: A:	Are there bone-strengthening drugs that may help protect me from a broken bone?
Q: A:	What is the difference between the bone-strengthening drugs?
Q: A:	How are these bone-strengthening drugs given?

Q: A:	What are the side effects of these drugs Which should I report to you? How can these side effects be managed?
Q: A:	What else can I do to strengthen my bones besides taking another drug, such as exercising, taking vitamin D or calcium, or changing my diet?
Q: A:	What tests or exams should I have before starting a bone-strengthening drug?
